- WOMEN AND REFORM
- Lucretia Mott (1793 1880)
- A Quaker who lectured for peace, temperance, worker's rights, and abolition.
- "Let her receive encouragement for the proper cultivation of all her powers, so that she may enter profitably into the active business of life."
- LUCRETIA MOTT
- Stanton, Elizabeth (1815-1902)
- Women's rights activist, feminist, editor, and writer.
- Helped organize the first women's rights convention
- "Because man and woman are the complement of one another, we need woman's thought in national affairs to make a safe and stable government."
- ELIZABETH STANTON
- Susan B. Anthony (1820 1906)
- Called for equal pay, college training for girls, and coeducation
- Led the women's rights movement along with Elizabeth Stanton
- Issued the "Declaration of Sentiments"
- "No man is good enough to govern any woman without her consent."
- SUSAN B. ANTHONY
- The seneca falls convention
- 1st women's rights convention
- Held in Seneca Falls, NY in 1848
- Attended by 200 women and 40 men
- Issued the "Declaration of Sentiments"
- A statement of grievances and demands
- Called upon women to organize
- "We hold these truths to be self evident: that all men and women are created equal"
